

INTRODUCTION

In today's gospel, the risen Christ appears to the disciples and offers them the gift of peace. Even amid doubts and questions, we experience the resurrection in our Sunday gathering around word and meal, and in our everyday lives. Throughout the coming Sundays of Easter the first two readings will be from the Acts of the Apostles and the first letter of Peter. Even as the early Christians proclaimed the resurrection, we rejoice in the new birth and living hope we receive in baptism.

We praise you for the gift of water that sustains life, and above all, we praise you for the gift of new life in Jesus Christ. Shower us with your Spirit, and renew our lives with your forgiveness, grace, and love. To you be given honor and praise through Jesus Christ our Lord

in the unity of the Holy Spirit, now and forever. Amen.

Word

FIRST READING

After the Holy Spirit comes to the apostles on Pentecost, Peter preaches the gospel to the gathered crowd. He tells them that Jesus, who obediently went to his death according to God's plan, was raised from the dead by God. Finally, he appeals to scripture, quoting Psalm 16:8-11, to show that Jesus is the Messiah: though crucified, the risen Jesus is now enthroned. A reading from Acts.

¹⁴⁹Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed the crowd, ²²⁴'You that are Israelites, listen to what I have to say: Jesus of Nazareth, a man attested to you by God with deeds of power, wonders, and signs that God did through him among you, as you yourselves know—²³this man, handed over to you according to the definite plan and foreknowledge of God, you crucified and killed by the hands of those outside the law. ²⁴But God raised him up, having freed him from death, because it was impossible for him to be held in its power.
²⁵For David says concerning him, 'I saw the Lord always before me, for he is at my right hand so that I will not be shaken; ²⁶therefore my heart was glad, and my tongue rejoiced; moreover my flesh will live in hope. ²⁷For you will not abandon my soul to Hades, or let your Holy One experience corruption. ²⁸You have made known to me the ways of life; you will make me full of gladness with your presence.' ²⁹⁴'Fellow Israelites, I may say to you confidently of our ancestor David that he both died and was buried, and his tomb is with us to this day.
³⁰Since he was a prophet, he knew that God had sworn with an oath to him that he would put one of his descendants on his throne. ³¹Foreseeing this, David spoke of the resurrection of the Messiah, saying, 'He was not abandoned to Hades, nor did his flesh experience corruption.' ³²This Jesus God raised up, and of that all of us are witnesses.''

Word of God, word of life. Thanks be to God.

Psalm 16

Acts 2:14a, 22-32

SECOND READING

This epistle was written to encourage Christians experiencing hardships and suffering because of their faith in Christ. The letter opens by blessing God for the living hope we have through Christ's resurrection even amid difficult circumstances and surroundings. A reading from 1 Peter.

³Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! By his great mercy he has given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, ⁴and into an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you, ⁵who are being protected by the power of God through faith for a salvation ready to be revealed in the last time. ⁶In this you rejoice, even if now for a little while you have had to suffer various trials, ⁷so that the genuineness of your faith—being more precious than gold that, though perishable, is tested by fire—may be found to result in praise and glory and honor when Jesus Christ is revealed. ⁸Although you have not seen him, you love him; and even though you do not see him now, you believe in him and rejoice with an indescribable and glorious joy, ⁹for you are receiving the outcome of your faith, the salvation of your souls.

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The holy gospel according to St. John. Glory to you, O Lord.

GOSPEL

John 20:19-31

The risen Jesus appears to his disciples, offering them a benediction, a commission, and the gift of the Holy Spirit. But one of their number is missing, and his unbelief prompts another visit from the Lord.

¹⁹When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁰After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. ²¹Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you."

²²When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. ²³If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained." ²⁴But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. ²⁵So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe."

²⁶A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." ²⁷Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." ²⁸Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" ²⁹Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me?

Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." ³⁰Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. ³¹But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.

The gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, O Christ.

SERMON

If you've been coming to the church for awhile, there are probably certain responses that have now become automatic for you. You don't even have to think about them very much—you hear the leading phrase and your response comes right out. For example...

If I say, "The Lord be with you," then you would say... (and also with you.) If I say, "Word of God, word of life," then you say... (Thanks be to God.) And if I say, "He is risen!," then you would say... (He is risen indeed!) Put compatings, that last one just might require a little m

But sometimes, that last one just might require a little more thought. Or else it might become something that has very little to do with you and me.

That's always been a challenge with belief in the resurrection. How easy it is to let that belief become something that's distant from us. It's something that happened to Jesus. It's something that we read about in the Bible or hear proclaimed in church once a year. At the most, it's something that I don't really have to think about until my life is over.

And yet, very early on in the life of the Christian church, believers became convinced that the resurrection was something that was having a direct affect on their own lives—and not only as something that might show up at the end of those lives, but also every day. They lived life in the light of the resurrection. Is that even a possibility for us?

I mean, sure, the resurrection was something wonderful for Jesus, but what does it have to do with us? Will the resurrection and five bucks get you a cup of coffee?

Today's gospel reading illustrates pretty clearly that we're all standing in two different worlds: a world of faith, and a world of doubt. A world of joy and a world of fear. I know that this gospel has forever ruined Thomas' reputation, and that he will forever be known as "doubting Thomas," but John the gospel author really wants us to be able to see ourselves in Thomas.

When you think about it, Thomas' reaction actually makes a lot of sense. He had just been confronted with something that should have been impossible. Jesus, whom he knew for a fact had died on the cross, had been seen by the other disciples and was alive!

But Thomas lived in the real world like the rest of us, and he knew that that couldn't be. So, for the moment, he was opting for the more reasonable approach. He wasn't going to just plunge headfirst into belief in something that didn't make any sense to him. What the other disciples had told him about was something that he couldn't explain, control or investigate on his own. And until he could do these things, he was going to hold on to his judgment.

That's reasonable, right?

But John gives us this story for the benefit of believers who never knew and never will know the historical Jesus. We notice that Thomas sets certain conditions for his belief: "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe." We also notice that Thomas apparently doesn't do any of these things. While he may be able to see the mark of the nails in Jesus' hands, the reading says nothing about Thomas putting his finger in the mark or putting his hand into Jesus' side. And the message there would seem to be that you don't need to be able to do that stuff in order to be able to believe. And Thomas himself goes on to make one of the greatest confessions of the New Testament: "My Lord and my God!"

Therefore, we who gather many, many years after Thomas made his confession are also called to have faith—to be willing to surrender some of our "reason" and our "rational thinking" to believe in what should be impossible. Dead people don't come back to life. And yet we are all called to give up the fear to love, to joy.


The resurrection is absolutely central to our Christian faith. Had Christ not been raised from the dead, our faith would be in vain. Yet on this belief everything that is important to us hangs: our belief about who God is, about what God is up to in this world, about who we are as children of God, about what we are supposed to be up to in this world. The belief is not merely a good ending to a rather sad story, or something to provide a little comfort for us as we near the end of life. God truly has "given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead" (1 Peter 1:3).

This is our legacy, our hope for years to come. And we are just getting started with our celebration of this hope! So, say it with me again:

He is risen! (He is risen indeed!") Amen!
