CHILDREN'S SERMON

Word

FIRST READING

In Athens, Paul faces the challenge of proclaiming the gospel to Greeks who know nothing of either Jewish or Christian tradition. He proclaims that the "unknown god" whom they worship is the true Lord of heaven and earth who will judge the world with justice through Jesus, whom God has raised from the dead. A reading from Acts.

²²Paul stood in front of the Areopagus and said, "Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. ²³For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, 'To an unknown god.' What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you.

²⁴The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines made by human hands, ²⁵nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. ²⁶From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, ²⁷so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him—though indeed he is not far from each one of us. ²⁸For 'In him we live and move and have our being'; as even some of your own poets have said, 'For we too are his offspring.'

Acts 17:22-31

Since we are God's offspring, we ought not to think that the deity is like gold, or silver, or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of mortals. ³⁰While God has overlooked the times of human ignorance, now he commands all people everywhere to repent, ³¹because he has fixed a day on which he will have the world judged in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed, and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead."

SECOND READING

The author of 1 Peter encourages Christians to remain faithful even in the face of defamation and persecution. In baptism we are made clean to act in accordance with what is right. A reading from 1 Peter.

¹³Who will harm you if you are eager to do what is good? ¹⁴But even if you do suffer for doing what is right, you are blessed. Do not fear what they fear, and do not be intimidated, ¹⁵but in your hearts sanctify Christ as Lord. Always be ready to make your defense to anyone who demands from you an accounting for the hope that is in you; ¹⁶yet do it with gentleness and reverence. Keep your conscience clear, so that, when you are maligned, those who abuse you for your good conduct in Christ may be put to shame.

1 Peter 3:13-22

¹⁷For it is better to suffer for doing good, if suffering should be God's will, than to suffer for doing evil. ¹⁸For Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring you to God. He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, ¹⁹in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, ²⁰who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were saved through water. ²¹And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you—not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, ²²who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him.

The holy gospel according to the 14th chapter of St. John. Glory to you, O Lord.

GOSPEL

John 14:15-21

In final words to his disciples on the night of his arrest, Jesus encourages obedience to his commandments and speaks of the Spirit, who will be with them forever.

Jesus said to the disciples: ¹⁵"If you love me, you will keep my commandments. ¹⁶And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate, to be with you forever. ¹⁷This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him nor knows him. You know him, because he abides with you, and he will be in you. ¹⁸"I will not leave you orphaned; I am coming to you. ¹⁹In a little while the world will no longer see me, but you will see me; because I live, you also will live. ²⁰On that day you will know that I am in my Father, and you in me, and I in you. ²¹They who have my commandments and keep them are those who love me; and those who love me will be loved by my Father, and I will love them and reveal myself to them."

The gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, O Christ.

SERMON

"Peace be with you."

The gospel of John tells us that these were the first words the risen Jesus spoke to his followers, when he came to them behind the doors of a locked room on the very first Easter Sunday. And we heard that story together in church on April 19^{th} .

Of course, those words are also very familiar to us for another reason: we use them in church every Sunday—or, at least, every Sunday when we've been able to meet together—because they're a

part of the exchange of peace. And the exchange of peace is that part of the worship that falls in between the Word and the Meal parts of the service—the part where we turn to our neighbors and shake their hands and wish them peace. And maybe I'm just a big liturgical nerd, but I honestly think it's kind of cool that at every service we take the time to greet one another with these resurrection words. And yet it's equally strange to think that a part of that greeting is probably going to be endangered for awhile.

The hand-shaking part, at any rate. We know that when we're able to start meeting together again, it's going to be necessary for us to continue some social distancing for awhile. And that will mean no shaking hands, no reaching out to your neighbor for the time being. Even touching elbows or bumping feet would probably bring us too close together. And that, undoubtedly, is going to feel a little awkward at first.

But whether we're allowed to touch each other or not, those words—peace be with you—are knit into the very fabric of our faith. We carry them with us wherever we go, wherever we stay. And through the gospels of this Easter season, God has been teaching us just what that means.

Don't panic, Jesus says to his very first followers. Don't let your life and your gatherings be filled with fear, he says to them—and to us.

Do not believe I have abandoned you or left you floundering. Peace is my enduring gift to you, and I am with you always.

The gospel reading that you just heard comes from that part of John's gospel that is sometimes called Jesus' farewell discourse. The setting is during the last supper, just a matter of hours before Jesus will be arrested, put on trial and sent to the cross. And yet, we encounter these words not as the last words from someone who is about to die and thus won't be able to speak any more. In them, we hear again and again that Jesus' death is not the end, but a going away to his Father. Within them, we find the promise that even this going away is not a permanent thing, for he is going to return—in his resurrection, in the gift of the Holy Spirit—and promises life and a greater unity with himself and God the Father than ever before.

But what does that look like, really? What does it mean for us to say that Christ stands in our midst?

It means that when people see us, they are seeing Christ.

I know there are times when that doesn't seem to make any sense. Times when all we can see is how far away from Christ we really are, how unworthy and sinful we really are. Me, represent Christ? Maybe on my very best day—but certainly not every day.

We should keep in mind, though, that this life of faith is a process for all of us. None of us is ever going to be perfect at it, and none of us have already arrived at the fullest measure of it. Jesus is still leading us on, moving us from fear to faith. And when we leave fear behind and walk by faith in God's love, we become more like Christ. And that transformation reveals Christ, who does stand in our midst.

Whenever we come together, whether it's here in person or here in front of our tablet and computer screens, we really do come as we are. We come as a mixture of good and bad, of faith and fear. We're all on the way to where God wants us to be.

And sometimes, we probably wish things could be different. We wish we could get rid of the fear completely, and be all faith. But still, we hear Jesus' promise to be with us, we hear his words that he will not leave us orphaned, and sometimes we also wonder if he is really with us or not, right here in our midst—or if we are on our own.

Well, here's one sign of the resurrection in our midst. In the past couple of months, we've seen how the circumstances that we've all been living under have brought out the worst in us. Selfishness. Hoarding. Exploitive behavior. Abusive behavior. A total lack of concern for how our own behavior is going to impact those around us. The tendency to spread half-truths and outright lies. It really makes you wonder why it has to be this way.

But at the same time, there have been plenty of signs of hope, if you know where to look for them. The determined faces of those working to help us and heal us. Those who grieve but who have not given up. Those who give comfort and strength. Acts of generosity and selflessness. Time given and spent in worthwhile activities. Words and gestures designed to encourage and support. We need all of these things. And in them, we see people moving out of the darkness and into the light. In these trying, turbulent times, we have been shown, again and again, that we are living under Christ's gift of peace.

So let us draw on the power of the Spirit for courage, to help us continue to move from fear to faith, so that we might become the light of Christ for a world in need.

CARING CONVERSATIONS

Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- Think or tell about a time you have felt alone and afraid.
- What do you do when you feel all alone or abandoned?
- Talk or think about a time you have felt God's presence when no one else seemed to care.

DEVOTIONS

Read: John 14:15-21.

The Gospel of John weaves themes into one another like a beautiful tapestry. That is clearly what is going on here in John 14. At the heart of it is that Jesus will not abandon his followers. He loves them and wants them to love him by keeping his commandments (v. 15), which is to love one another (13:34). Jesus will remain with us, his followers, through the presence of "another Advocate" (v. 16), just as Jesus himself is an advocate (1 John 2:1). The word "advocate" in the original Greek also means counselor, helper, or intercessor. The Advocate is here to help us. Like Jesus, the other advocate is the Holy Spirit, "Spirit of truth," just as Jesus is the truth (John 14:6). After Jesus' death, resurrection, and ascension, we still have Jesus with us through the Advocate, the Spirit of truth, the Spirit of Christ Jesus. The Holy Spirit makes Christ a reality in our lives today in that we may love one another and the world as God does (John 3:16). We are not abandoned after Jesus' ascension; we are empowered to live out the new commandment to love one another and the world. How do you, as a follower of Jesus, live out the new commandment?

Pray: The Lord's Prayer.

SERVICE

Jesus gives us the commandment to love others by the power of the Holy Spirit (John 14:15-21). There are times when it is not easy to love because of actions or things said or not said. Think of someone that it is not easy to care for and offer this prayer for them: **Dear Jesus, open my heart to the needs of others. Help me to care for (name) with your love. Amen.**

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

In John 14:15-21, Jesus gives us the promise of the Holy Spirit. One pivotal principle of faith formation is that faith is formed by the power of the Holy Spirit through personal, trusted relationships. Write a list of people who have influenced your life of faith. How did they influence you? Name a person who you have or would like to influence and pray for them this week asking for the power of the Holy Spirit to form a trusted relationship.
