
Fifth Sunday After Easter Sunday, May 10, 2020



Word

FIRST READING Acts 7:55-60

Stephen was one of the seven men chosen by the apostles to serve tables so that the apostles could be free to serve the word (Acts 6:1-6). Stephen does more than distribute food, however. For his preaching of God's word, he becomes the first martyr of the faith. A reading from Acts.

⁵⁵Filled with the Holy Spirit, Stephen gazed into heaven and saw the glory of God and Jesus standing at the right hand of God. ⁵⁶"Look," he said, "I see the heavens opened and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God!" ⁵⁷But they covered their ears, and with a loud shout all rushed together against him. ⁵⁸Then they dragged him out of the city and began to stone him; and the witnesses laid their coats at the feet of a young man named Saul. ⁵⁹While they were stoning Stephen, he prayed, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit." ⁶⁰Then he knelt down and cried out in a loud voice, "Lord, do not hold this sin against them." When he had said this, he died.

¹⁶Let your face shine upon your servant; save me in your steadfast love."


SECOND READING 1 Peter 2:2-10

Christ is the cornerstone of God's saving work and the foundation of our lives. We are God's chosen, holy people who continuously celebrate and declare the mercy of God we experience through Jesus Christ. A reading from 1 Peter.

²Like newborn infants, long for the pure, spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow into salvation—³if indeed you have tasted that the Lord is good. ⁴Come to him, a living stone, though rejected by mortals yet chosen and precious in God's sight, and ⁵like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. ⁶For it stands in scripture: See, I am laying in Zion a stone, a cornerstone chosen and precious; and whoever believes in him will not be put to shame." ⁷To you then who believe, he is precious; but for those who do not believe, "The stone that the builders rejected has become the very head of the corner," ⁸and "A stone that makes them stumble, and a rock that makes them fall." They stumble because they disobey the word, as they were destined to do. ⁹But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. ¹⁰Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION



The holy gospel according to the 14th chapter of St. John. Glory to you, O Lord.

GOSPEL John 14:1-14

On the night that he is to be arrested, Jesus shares final words with his disciples. As the one through whom God is known, he promises to go before them and act on their behalf.

Jesus said to the disciples: ¹"Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me. ²In my Father's house there are many dwelling places. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? ³And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also. ⁴And you know the way to the place where I am going." ⁵Thomas said to him, "Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?" ⁶Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. ⁷If you know me, you will know my Father also. From now on you do know him and have seen him." 8Philip said to him, "Lord, show us the Father, and we will be satisfied." ⁹Jesus said to him, "Have I been with you all this time, Philip, and you still do not know me? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father How can you say, 'Show us the Father'? ¹⁰Do you not believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me? The words that I say to you I do not speak on my own; but the Father who dwells in me does his works. ¹¹Believe me that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; but if you do not, then believe me because of the works themselves. ¹²Very truly, I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father. ¹³I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. ¹⁴If in my name you ask me for anything, I will do it."

The gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, O Christ.

SERMON

"When I get to heaven, I'm gonna shake God's hand Thank him for more blessings than one man can stand Then I'm gonna get a guitar and start a rock-n-roll band Check into a swell hotel; ain't the afterlife grand?

And then I'm gonna get a cocktail: vodka and ginger ale I'm gonna smoke a cigarette that's nine miles long I'm gonna kiss that pretty girl on the tilt-a-whirl 'Cause this old man is goin' to town."

Those words come from a song that came out in 2018. They were written, and sung, by the great singer-songwriter John Prine, who died just a month ago from complications due to the corona virus. John was 72 at the time of his death. That song was the last song on his final album.

And as fun as that song may be, once we start thinking about the words, we might have to admit that John's ideas about what's waiting for us after we die are kind of surprising. Most of us have probably never thought about heaven as a place for rockn-roll bands, cocktails and nine-mile cigarettes. We might even be a little afraid that even thinking such things might be just a little bit blasphemous.

But as I said in the class about heaven that I taught last fall, there's a lot more that we don't know about heaven than what we do. The Bible gives us a few, tantalizing details, but then leaves the rest mostly shrouded in mystery.

We get a few of those details in the gospel we just shared. In fact, along with certain parts of the book of Revelation, John, chapter 14, tells us the most about what's waiting for us: the Father's house with its many rooms (or many mansions, if you're reading the King James version); the place that is being prepared there for all of us; the promise of Jesus' return along with the promise to take us there—to take us all the way to himself. And I don't think we can even begin to imagine the number of times this passage has been read at someone's funeral or memorial service throughout history or how much comfort it has brought to grieving families.

And Jesus meant these words to be comforting. In the gospel, they show up right after Jesus has told his disciples that he is going to be going away from them. Jesus will be leaving soon, and where he is going his disciples are not going to be able to follow. Now, John doesn't tell us how the disciples reacted to these words, but I think we can imagine. They must've felt shocked, dismayed, saddened. How they must have struggled to try and understand. But Jesus immediately follows up with these words of comfort for them, full of promises about the Father's house. About going home.

Which ought to tell us that, above all, our God is a prodigal. I know that we might not always like that word, because it probably reminds us of the parable of the prodigal son. And when we think of the prodigal son, we probably think of someone who was extravagantly wasteful—who took his share of his father's property and threw it all away and ended up with nothing. A word like that couldn't describe God, could it?

And yet, try to think of prodigal as a word that can also mean extraordinarily generous, excessively giving, effusive, overflowing. And then also think of some of the examples of prodigality from Jesus' own ministry:

When the wine is running low at the wedding at Cana, Jesus makes more from some water the servants provide. And not just a little wine—not just enough to tide them over until the end of the party—we're talking 150 gallons of wine.

When the crowds are with Jesus out in the wilderness and it's been a long day, Jesus wants to give them all something to eat. And when the disciples discover that there's only a little bread and fish at hand, Jesus blesses the food and it becomes enough to feed 5,000, with plenty of leftovers.

When the outsider comes to Jesus—someone who has probably been told all their life that they'll never fit in, they'll never belong—he welcomes, he invites, he includes—and whole lives are changed.

The night of his betrayal, Jesus gathered with his disciples for a final meal. And at that meal, he gave them, not just bread and wine, but also his body and blood. And the next day, on the cross, he gave his life.

And ever since then, whenever followers of Jesus come together to remember and celebrate these things, we know that he is with us still. And his body and blood, his life and his spirit continue to uphold us, to guide us and strengthen us, all throughout our lives. And when those lives are over, we believe that we will be welcomed home.

God is a prodigal.

And sometimes, our view of what life is and what life is all about can be so miserly. It's measured and limited. Oh, it usually starts out hopefully enough, with so much potential, but in the end it always fades away. It can be long or it can be much too brief, but the truth is, in every case, it's never long enough. And when the end comes, we've all got to face facts and admit defeat.

But if God is a prodigal—which is just what the Bible tells us—then we've got plenty of reason to hold onto hope. For the God who so recklessly, extravagantly and over-flowingly gave life in the first place, will also give life beyond death. And what sometimes seems to us like the end of the road is in reality a homecoming. Look at all that God has gone through down through the ages to save us, find us, embrace us. Shall death defeat the plans of such an extravagantly life-giving God? I don't think so.

I don't really know if we can expect to find cocktails and tilt-a-whirls in the afterlife. All I really know is that there are many rooms in the Father's house. And one fine day, by the grace of God, you and I will be there, too. Home. Amen.

DEVOTIONS



Read: Acts 7:55-60.

Martyrdom is too often spoken of today in terms of suicide bombs that kill. That is not a Christian martyr. Stephen presents the model of Christian martyrdom for all time. He innocently suffers and dies at the hands of others; he does not act violently. Stephen imitates Christ's death by blessing one's enemies (v. 60). He also experiences the holy bliss of being filled with the Holy Spirit and seeing the glory of God and Jesus (v. 55). He has a rapturous experience of the triune God. Few of us will have that same experience, but we are still all martyrs. The word simply means "witness." We are witnesses to God's living presence when we suffer unfairly for the love of God, when we bless others, and when we experience the peace that passes all human understanding. In the midst of a world of hate, violence, and self-promotion, it is not possible to be a faithful witness on our own. It is the work of God that fills us with the Holy Spirit, witnesses to the love of God, and blesses others. Christian martyrdom is all around us. Who has been a witness to the love of God for you recently? Pray: O, Holy Jesus, give me faith to witness to your love, to suffer with others for the sake of love, and to bless others with hope in your Easter victory. Amen.
