

#### INTRODUCTION

In today's gospel, Jesus reveals his power over death by raising Lazarus from the dead. The prophet Ezekiel prophesies God breathing new life into dry bones. To those in exile or living in the shadows of death, these stories proclaim God's promise of resurrection. In baptism we die with Christ that we might also be raised with him to new life. At the Easter Vigil we will welcome the newly baptized as we remember God's unfailing promise in our baptism.

# Word

#### FIRST READING Ezekiel 37:1-14

Ezekiel's vision of the valley of dry bones is a promise that Israel as a nation, though dead in exile, will live again in their land through God's life-giving spirit. Three times Israel is assured that through this vision they will know that "I am the LORD." A reading from Ezekiel.

<sup>1</sup>The hand of the LORD came upon me, and he brought me out by the spirit of the LORD and set me down in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones. <sup>2</sup>He led me all around them; there were very many lying in the valley, and they were very dry. <sup>3</sup>He said to me, "Mortal, can these bones live?" I answered, "O Lord GOD, you know."

<sup>4</sup>Then he said to me, "Prophesy to these bones, and say to them: O dry bones, hear the word of the LORD. <sup>5</sup>Thus says the Lord GOD to these bones: I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live. <sup>6</sup>I will lay sinews on you, and will cause flesh to come upon you, and cover you with skin, and put breath in you, and you shall live; and you shall know that I am the LORD." <sup>7</sup>So I prophesied as I had been commanded; and as I prophesied, suddenly there was a noise, a rattling, and the bones came together, bone to its bone. 8I looked, and there were sinews on them, and flesh had come upon them, and skin had covered them; but there was no breath in them. <sup>9</sup>Then he said to me, "Prophesy to the breath, prophesy, mortal, and say to the breath: Thus says the Lord GOD: Come from the four winds, O breath, and breathe upon these slain, that they may live." <sup>10</sup>I prophesied as he commanded me, and the breath came into them, and they lived, and stood on their feet, a vast multitude. <sup>11</sup>Then he said to me, "Mortal, these bones are the whole house of Israel. They say, 'Our bones are dried up, and our hope is lost; we are cut off completely.' <sup>12</sup>Therefore prophesy, and say to them, Thus says the Lord GOD: I am going to open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people; and I will bring you back to the land of Israel. <sup>13</sup>And you shall know that I am the LORD, when I open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people. <sup>14</sup>I will put my spirit within you, and you shall live, and I will place you on your own soil; then you shall know that I, the LORD, have spoken and will act, says the LORD."

For Paul, Christian spirituality entails living in the reality of the Holy Spirit. The driving force behind our actions and values is not our sinful desire for self-satisfaction but the very Spirit by which God raised Jesus from the dead and will also raise us from the dead. A reading from Romans.

<sup>6</sup>To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. <sup>7</sup>For this reason the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law—indeed it cannot, <sup>8</sup> and those who are in the flesh cannot please God. <sup>9</sup>But you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. <sup>10</sup>But if Christ is in you, though the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. <sup>11</sup>If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you.

#### **GOSPEL ACCLAMATION**



GOSPEL John 11:1-45

Jesus is moved to sorrow when his friend Lazarus falls ill and dies. Then, in a dramatic scene, he calls his friend out of the tomb and restores him to life.

- 1: A reading from the Holy Gospel according to the eleventh chapter of St. John. **Glory to you, O Lord.** Now a certain man was ill, Lazarus of Bethany, the village of Mary and her sister Martha. <sup>2</sup> Mary was the one who anointed the Lord with perfume and wiped his feet with her hair; her brother Lazarus was ill. <sup>3</sup> So the sisters sent a message to Jesus, "Lord, he whom you love is ill." <sup>4</sup> But when Jesus heard it, he said,
- 2: "This illness does not lead to death; rather it is for God's glory, so that the Son of God may be glorified through it."
- 1: <sup>5</sup> Accordingly, though Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus, <sup>6</sup> after having heard that Lazarus was ill, he stayed two days longer in the place where he was. <sup>7</sup> Then after this he said to the disciples,
- 2: "Let us go to Judea again."
- 1: <sup>8</sup> The disciples said to him,

# All: "Rabbi, the Jews were just now trying to stone you, and are you going there again?"

- 1: <sup>9</sup> Jesus answered,
- 2: "Are there not twelve hours of daylight? Those who walk during the day do not stumble, because they see the light of this world. <sup>10</sup> But those who walk at night stumble, because the light is not in them."
- 1: <sup>11</sup> After saying this, he told them,
- 2: "Our friend Lazarus has fallen asleep, but I am going there to awaken him."
- 1: <sup>12</sup> The disciples said to him,

## All: "Lord, if he has fallen asleep, he will be all right."

- 1: <sup>13</sup> Jesus, however, had been speaking about his death, but they thought that he was referring merely to sleep. <sup>14</sup> Then Jesus told them plainly,
- 2: "Lazarus is dead. <sup>15</sup> For your sake I am glad I was not there, so that you may believe. But let us go to him."
- 1: <sup>16</sup> Thomas, who was called the Twin, said to his fellow disciples,
- 3: "Let us also go, that we may die with him."
- 1: When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb four days. <sup>18</sup> Now Bethany was near Jerusalem, some two miles away, <sup>19</sup> and many of the Jews had come to Martha and Mary to console them about their brother. <sup>20</sup> When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went and met him, while Mary stayed at home. <sup>21</sup> Martha said to Jesus,
- 3: "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. <sup>22</sup> But even now I know that God will give you whatever you ask of him."
- 1: <sup>23</sup> Jesus said to her,
- 2: "Your brother will rise again."
- 1: <sup>24</sup> Martha said to him,
- 3: "I know that he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day."
- 1: <sup>25</sup> Jesus said to her,
- 2: "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, <sup>26</sup> and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?"
- 1: <sup>27</sup> She said to him,
- 3: "Yes, Lord, I believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, the one coming into the world."

- 1: When she had said this, she went back and called her sister Mary, and told her privately, "The Teacher is here and is calling for you." <sup>29</sup> And when she heard it, she got up quickly and went to him. <sup>30</sup> Now Jesus had not yet come to the village, but was still at the place where Martha had met him. <sup>31</sup> The Jews who were with her in the house, consoling her, saw Mary get up quickly and go out. They followed her because they thought that she was going to the tomb to weep there. <sup>32</sup> When Mary came where Jesus was and saw him, she knelt at his feet and said to him,
- 3: "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died."
- 1: <sup>33</sup> When Jesus saw her weeping, and the Jews who came with her also weeping, he was greatly disturbed in spirit and deeply moved. <sup>34</sup> He said,
- 2: "Where have you laid him?"
- 1: They said to him,
- 2, 3: "Lord, come and see."
- 1: <sup>35</sup> Jesus began to weep. <sup>36</sup> So the Jews said,

#### All: "See how he loved him!"

1: <sup>37</sup> But some of them said,

# All: "Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?"

- 1: Then Jesus, again greatly disturbed, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone was lying against it. <sup>39</sup> Jesus said,
- 2: "Take away the stone."
- 1: Martha, the sister of the dead man, said to him,
- 3: "Lord, already there is a stench because he has been dead four days."
- 1: <sup>40</sup> Jesus said to her,
- 2: "Did I not tell you that if you believed, you would see the glory of God?"
- 1: <sup>41</sup> So they took away the stone. And Jesus looked upward and said,
- 2: "Father, I thank you for having heard me. <sup>42</sup> I knew that you always hear me, but I have said this for the sake of the crowd standing here, so that they may believe that you sent me."
- 1: <sup>43</sup> When he had said this, he cried with a loud voice,
- 2: "Lazarus, come out!"
- 1: <sup>44</sup> The dead man came out, his hands and feet bound with strips of cloth, and his face wrapped in a cloth. Jesus said to them,
- 2: "Unbind him, and let him go."
- 1: Many of the Jews therefore, who had come with Mary and had seen what Jesus did, believed in him. The Gospel of the Lord.

#### All: Praise to you, O Christ.

#### **SERMON**

Throughout this Lenten season, we have been asking lots of questions, guided by the gospels we've been sharing. And all of those questions have been intended to represent our confusion, our times of misunderstanding, our struggle to make sense of some of the most basic things that we say we believe in. But it's our question for today that is, I believe, the most personal, the most heartfelt of them all.

Why, Jesus, did you let my loved one die?

It's a question that comes out of great loss, out of a time when nothing seems to make any sense. The tragedy, the unfairness of it all seems to cut us so deeply, and we don't always know what to do with all the pain. In the gospel reading that we just heard, it's found in the statements made by Martha and Mary when they first see Jesus after their brother's death. "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died."

And even if you personally have never said anything remotely like this, I'm sure you can understand where it's coming from. In fact, it's not difficult at all to reformulate that statement for a countless number of situations. As in...Lord, if you had been here...I would never have felt so abandoned as a child...my husband would never have become an alcoholic...my son would never have lost his eyesight in an accident...that corporation would never have dumped toxic chemicals in our water supply...the Coronavirus never would have even got started in the first place...and on and on and on. So many things that could have turned out differently—and maybe for the better, if only the Lord had intervened.

As I'm sure you can imagine, I've been able to see a fair amount of tragedy over the years. And some of it has been so unexplainable, so heart-rending, that I didn't really know what to say when I was with the people who were going through it. I remember the day after I was ordained—thirty years ago this year—at a reception when, amid all the joy, a man I didn't even know came up to me and said that he pitied me. Because he thought I was going to have a hard life. Because I was going to see things, and experience things, and walk along roads with people that I might not necessarily always want to walk. And I remember how I bristled inside at his talk. This was not something that I wanted to hear—on this weekend above any other weekend. How dare he come into my celebration with these words of doom? So I put him out of my mind.

But thirty years later, I realize that there was truth in what he said. Life <u>is</u> hard sometimes. But not just for me. And not just for pastors in general. Everybody has to go through stuff. And it seems to me that when we do, there are often two questions that keep coming up, over and over again: Why did this happen? And, can God still be trusted?

That first one can be so urgent that it dominates everything. Why, O Lord? What did I do wrong? Did I do something to deserve this? Am I being punished for something? If only I could go back and do things differently next time. Why did you let my loved one die?

But there are no easy explanations for these things. Because we're human, it's only natural that we're going to want to know why. And because we are only human, we can't always know why. I believe that the day will come—when we're with God in his eternal kingdom—when we will know why, when every question that we've ever had will be answered. And that is truly wonderful to think about.

But we're not there yet.

And as many times as there may be when we're sure that we could use some answers, there are many more times when what we really need is faith.

And that leads us right into the second question. Can God still be trusted?

And the answer to that one can be found when we start to realize that the God in whom we believe doesn't come around only when the sun is shining and all is right with the world. And we can know that because there's a cross up there. And over the next couple of weeks, you and I are going to have the opportunity to plunge deep once more into the mystery of our salvation. And it will be brought home again that that cross is for all of us. Jesus walks through the valley of the shadow of death, of loss and grief and pain—before we get there, so that he can get ready to catch us. We don't have to go through these things alone.


Some years ago, there was a pastor who learned of a terrible tragedy among the congregation she was serving. Two people had died. The first was a 31 year-old man who was suffering from deep mental illness and was refusing to take his medication. The second was his 65 year-old father, who somehow became convinced that his son had now become a danger to others, and so shot and killed his own son, and then turned the gun on himself and took his own life.

When the pastor went to visit the grieving family, she said that those two questions were everywhere. Why did this happen, and can the Lord still be trusted. And yet, during the very same visit, she was able to meet Lauren, the 3-year old granddaughter of the deceased father. Lauren was sitting on her grandmother's knee, wearing a bib with a duck on it and with a smile on her face. "Tell Joanna what you say before you have your supper," her grandmother prompted. And she did, in her little, 3-year old voice: God is great. God is good. And in that moment, the pastor realized the truth of those words, even in the midst of the trauma that had hit this family so hard.

I think we all know at least something of what it's like to be hit that hard. And sometimes, when it all gets too overwhelming, we can't help but turn away. Sometimes it's so hard for us to keep trusting, and that's like being shut up in a

tomb, with a big rock in front of it. But the one who walks with us, the one who stands outside by that rock and calls to us, is the resurrection and the life. And he is calling us to life. Do you believe it? God is still great and God is still good. Amen.

#### **CARING CONVERSATIONS**



Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- Tell or think about something you are looking forward to doing in the future.
- How does thinking about a future moment impact your life today?
- Both Ezekiel 37 and Jesus in John 11 talk about God's power to give life. How does the promise of the resurrection and God's power to give life influence you today?

#### **DEVOTIONS**



Read: John 11:1-45.

With the story of the raising of Lazarus we have Jesus making clear that Jesus is not only the source of "the resurrection on the last day" (v. 24), but the source of life now. Jesus does not just say he is the resurrection. He says, "I am the resurrection and the life" (v. 25). In this story we gain understanding of what it means that Jesus is the "Messiah, the Son of God, the one coming into the world" (v. 27). The future hope of the resurrections is so important and so real that it changes our life in the present. Even though Jesus weeps with his friends (v. 35), grief does not control his—or our—life. Our lives are to be freed from the daily powers of sin and death. "Unbind him and let him go" (v. 44) is the message for us, too. Jesus comes to us when our burdens are great to unbind us and set us free. Jesus says, "[E]veryone who lives and believes in me will never die" (v. 26). How does Jesus' resurrection make a difference in your life today? How does faith in Jesus impact your priorities, your values, your relationships? Pray: God of resurrection promise, remind us of the new life we are given each day through Christ our Lord. Amen.

#### SERVICE



Knowing one is nearing the end of their life is difficult for the person and for family and loved ones. As one draws closer to death we can be comforted to know of the resurrection and new life. This does not mean it will be easy. Jesus gives all who believe in him the promise of eternal life. Do you know of someone who has a loved one in the final stages of life? Is there a way you can support them through listening, prayer, meals, or household help?

#### **RITUALS AND TRADITIONS**



During the fifth week in Lent, light five of the six purple candles on your Lenten Candle Cross. The acronym **ACTS** (Adoration, Confession, Thanksgiving, Supplication) has been introduced as a way to pray. This week use this acronym as a guide for prayer.

*Pray:* Dear God, I praise you for . . . , Forgive me for . . . , I thank you for . . . , I pray for (name of people or situations) . . . , in the name of your Son, Jesus Christ, amen.
