


## **FIRST READING**

#### Ezekiel 34:11-16, 20-24

Because Israel's kings proved to be bad shepherds, Ezekiel declares that the LORD will assume the role of shepherd in Israel. The LORD will also set over them a shepherd-messiah, "my servant David," who will feed and care for the people. A reading from Ezekiel.

<sup>11</sup>Thus says the Lord GOD: I myself will search for my sheep, and will seek them out. <sup>12</sup>As shepherds seek out their flocks when they are among their scattered sheep, so I will seek out my sheep. I will rescue them from all the places to which they have been scattered on a day of clouds and thick darkness. <sup>13</sup>I will bring them out from the peoples and gather them from the countries, and will bring them into their own land; and I will feed them on the mountains of Israel, by the watercourses, and in all the inhabited parts of the land. <sup>14</sup>I will feed them with good pasture, and the mountain heights of Israel shall be their pasture; there they shall lie down in good grazing land, and they shall feed on rich pasture on the mountains of Israel. <sup>15</sup>I myself will be the shepherd of my sheep, and I will make them lie down, says the Lord GOD. <sup>16</sup>I will seek the lost, and I will bring back the strayed, and I will bind up the injured, and I will strengthen the weak, but the fat and the strong I will destroy. I will feed them with justice. <sup>20</sup>Therefore, thus says the Lord GOD to them: I myself will judge between the fat sheep and the lean sheep. <sup>21</sup>Because you pushed with flank and shoulder, and butted at all the weak animals with your horns until you scattered them far and wide, <sup>22</sup>I will save my flock, and they shall no longer be ravaged; and I will judge between sheep and sheep. <sup>23</sup>I will set up over them one shepherd, my servant David, and he shall feed them: he shall feed them and be their shepherd. <sup>24</sup>And I, the LORD, will be their God, and my servant David shall be prince among them; I, the LORD, have spoken.

### SECOND READING

#### Ephesians 1:15-23

In this passage, God is praised for revealing ultimate divine power in raising Jesus from the dead. The resurrected, exalted Christ is Lord of both the church and the entire universe, now and in the age to come. A reading from Ephesians.

<sup>15</sup>I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love toward all the saints, and for this reason <sup>16</sup>I do not cease to give thanks for you as I remember you in my prayers. <sup>17</sup>I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, <sup>18</sup>so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, <sup>19</sup>and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power. <sup>20</sup>God put this power to work in Christ when he raised him from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly places, <sup>21</sup>far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in the age to come. <sup>22</sup>And he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, <sup>23</sup>which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.

# GOSPEL

#### Matthew 25:31-46

p. 151

Jesus compares himself to a king who moves among his subjects to see how he is treated: what is done for the least of those who belong to his family is truly done for him.

Jesus said to the disciples: <sup>31</sup>"When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on the throne of his glory. <sup>32</sup>All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, <sup>33</sup>and he will put the sheep at his right hand and the goats at the left. <sup>34</sup>Then the king will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; <sup>35</sup> for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, <sup>36</sup>I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.' <sup>37</sup>Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? <sup>38</sup>And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? <sup>39</sup>And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?' <sup>40</sup>And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family you did it to me.' <sup>41</sup>Then he will say to those at his left hand, 'You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; <sup>42</sup> for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, <sup>43</sup>I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me.' <sup>44</sup>Then they also will answer, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or

naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?' <sup>45</sup>Then he will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me.' <sup>46</sup>And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."

#### The gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, O Christ.

#### SERMON

So, how is your day going?

You've probably been asked that question, or something like it, thousands of times by now. You've been asked it by members of your family, by your friends, by that casual acquaintance you bump into at the grocery store.

And what does your response to that question look like? More likely than not, it's probably a simple, basic, one-word response: fine, good, okay. Forgettable, in other words.

But there is a mother somewhere who has a different way of asking the same question. As she tucks her children into bed each night, their teeth brushed and their hair still damp from the bathtub, she asks them a question: "Where did you meet God today?" And they tell her, one by one: a teacher helped me, there was a homeless person in the park, I saw a tree with lots of flowers in it. She tells them where she met God, too. Before the children drop off to sleep, the stuff of their day has become the substance of their prayer.

Earlier this year, on April 12<sup>th</sup>, we celebrated Easter together. Not together in person, of course, because, by that time, everything was online. But if you wished, and if you had access to a computer, phone or tablet, you could have worshipped with us that day. And you may be aware that there is more than one option for scripture readings that day. You can always read the story of the resurrection from whatever gospel the church has mainly been reading from that particular year, which, this year, was Matthew. Or, you can always choose to read the story of the resurrection from the gospel of John. I'm sure you remember how that one goes. Early in the morning on the first day of the week, Mary Magdalene comes to the tomb of Jesus. But when she gets there, she notices that the stone has been rolled away from in front of the tomb. Not knowing what's going on, she runs to tell the disciples. But then Mary herself returns to the tomb to weep. And as she does, she manages to look inside the tomb this time, and there she sees two angels in white, who ask her why she is weeping. Then she turns around, and there's this strange man standing there, a man whom she doesn't recognize. Supposing him to be the gardener, she asks him if he has taken the body of Jesus away. She wants to recover the body so that she can give him a decent burial. Then the stranger calls out her name, and she suddenly realizes that it's Jesus. After this, when she returns to the disciples, she is able to tell them, "I have seen the Lord," and she is the first person who is able to say that. And, as I'm sure you can imagine, her life was forever changed because of that encounter.

And, whether we always recognize it or not, we have had plenty of encounters with the risen Jesus ourselves. We have met him in scripture, in prayer, in song. We have met him in those who have cared for us. We have met him in some of the strangers that have been placed on our way. And when we realize that we have met him, it can change our lives, too.

Today our church gathers to celebrate the last Sunday of the church year, Christ the King Sunday. And our gospel reading for this Sunday gives us a story about the last judgment, and the king who presides over it. And you probably noticed that a lot about that judgment came down to recognition. Do we see Christ in others? Do others see Christ in us? We know that our salvation is dependent upon Christ alone, but when you read a gospel like this one, you can't help but feel that at least some of the final judgment is going to involve how we have treated those who truly are "the least of these."

And so it would seem, going forward, that one of the things that we can always be working on is striving to recognize Jesus. And how do we do that? Well, I have a few suggestions:

1. Show kindness to strangers. The person who brings you your groceries, or checks them out in the store. The one who comes to your house to repair or clean something. The one driving in front of


you who seems to be driving a little slow because they're looking for an address. Even in small ways, our patience and kindness with others is going to make a difference. And it'll be good for your blood pressure, too!

2. Feed the hungry. You've been very good about dropping things off to give to Doorstep and the Rescue Mission—and their needs have only increased during the pandemic. So let's keep up the good work and continue to show support for those who provide food and shelter to the most vulnerable.

3. Care for the sick. While visiting those who are hospitalized, those in nursing homes is still pretty limited right now, there are other ways that we can show our care. I know some of you have brought meals to those who have returned home after a hospital stay, and I thank you for doing that. Others in our community may need help in other ways—putting out their trash, for instance, or offering to rake some leaves. When possible and appropriate, rides to doctor's appointments may be needed. Even sending a card or giving someone a call can be much appreciated.

We do these sorts of things not because we're trying to earn points with God, or because we're afraid of God, but simply because it's what God wants us to do. One of the very best things that we can do with our lives is to go out there and see Christ in others. Every day that we're blessed to have on this earth can be a blessed day when we meet God. So, go ahead. Answer the question. Where have you met God today? Amen.



# What's Happening at OSLC
