CHILDREN'S SERMON

FIRST READING

Word

Isaiah 40:1-11

In grand, flowing, poetic lines, the prophet announces that the exile of God's people in Babylon is over. God will deliver Israel and will care for her as a shepherd cares for the sheep. This word can be trusted, because the only enduring reality in life is the word of God. A reading from Isaiah.

¹Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God. ²Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that she has served her term, that her penalty is paid, that she has received from the LORD's hand double for all her sins. ³A voice cries out: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the LORD, make straight in the desert a highway for our God. ⁴Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain. ⁵Then the glory of the LORD shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together, for the mouth of the LORD has spoken." ⁶A voice says, "Cry out!" And I said, "What shall I cry?" All people are grass, their constancy is like the flower of the field. ⁷The grass withers, the flower fades, when the breath of the LORD blows upon it; surely the people are grass. ⁸The grass withers, the flower fades; but the word of our God will stand forever. ⁹Get you up to a high mountain, O Zion, herald of good tidings; lift up your voice with strength, O Jerusalem, herald of good tidings, lift it up, do not fear; say to the cities of Judah, "Here is your God!" ¹⁰See, the Lord GOD comes with might, and his arm rules for him; his reward is with him, and his recompense before him. ¹¹He will feed his flock like a shepherd; he will gather the lambs in his arms, and carry them in his bosom, and gently lead the mother sheep.

SECOND READING

2 Peter 3:8-15a

This short letter deals with pressing concerns regarding the final advent of Jesus, especially concerns that could arise over its apparent delay. The author of the letter calls on Christians to anticipate the promised coming of the Lord through conduct dedicated to God. A reading from 2 Peter.

⁸Do not ignore this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like one day. ⁹The Lord is not slow about his promise, as some think of slowness, but is patient with you, not wanting any to perish, but all to come to repentance. ¹⁰But the day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then the heavens will pass away with a loud noise, and the elements will be dissolved with fire, and the earth and everything that is done on it will be disclosed. ¹¹Since all these things are to be dissolved in this way, what sort of persons ought you to be in leading lives of holiness and godliness, ¹²waiting for and hastening the coming of the day of God, because of which the heavens will be set ablaze and dissolved, and the elements will melt with fire? ¹³But, in accordance with his promise, we wait for new heavens and a new earth, where righteousness is at home. ¹⁴Therefore, beloved, while you are waiting for these things, strive to be found by him at peace, without spot or blemish; ^{15a}and regard the patience of our Lord as salvation.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

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The holy gospel according to the 1st chapter of St. Mark. Glory to you, O Lord.

GOSPEL

Mark 1:1-8

The Gospel of Mark does not begin with a story of Jesus' birth but with the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: Prepare the way of the Lord.

¹The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. ²As it is written in the prophet Isaiah, "See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way; ³the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight,'" ⁴John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. ⁵And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. ⁶Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. ⁷He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. ⁸I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holv Spirit."

The gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, O Christ.

SERMON

Where do you think you would find the longest, straightest road in the United States?

You might be inclined to guess that it's somewhere in Kansas—somewhere west of here on I-

70.

But, no. Depending on how you define those terms—the longest, straightest road—there are many who would say that the answer can be found in North Dakota. Highway 46, which stretches straight across 123 miles of North Dakota prairie from Highway 30 in the west to a nameless county blacktop just past 1-29 in the east.

Which is impressive. But if you want to quibble, it's not <u>perfectly</u> straight. Nearly every straight road is still going to shift a little bit here and there, bending just a bit around a rock or a tree or making an adjustment to cross a bridge—and Highway 46 does this, too. In fact, when it comes to being perfectly straight, the best that Highway 46 has to offer is a 31 mile stretch from Gackle to Beaver Creek.

Which is still pretty impressive, though you should know that there is another very straight road in this country—Interstate 80, where it runs through the Bonneville Salt Flats in Utah. That part happens to be 35 miles long.

Now I can remember, all the way back when I was 16 years old and taking Driver's Ed, that the instructor of that class told us that those very straight roads were the ones you had to watch out for. The danger, he said, was when the drive got so monotonous that you stopped paying attention. And that's when you start to drift off of the road, drift into the other lane—and who knows what kind of trouble is going to come from doing something like that.

In the case of our reading today from the prophet Isaiah, though, the straight road is treated, not as a novelty, and not as a liability, but as something very good. This particular section of Isaiah seems to come from the time when the exile of the people of Israel was just beginning to come to an end. For more than a generation they had been taken away from their homeland and forced to make the best of things in a new home far away.

But now, through the prophet, a new word from God comes—a word of comfort and peace. Better times were coming, were already on the horizon, and soon they would be able to see for themselves that for all that they have been through together, they would all receive a double portion of God's grace. That sounds pretty wonderful, doesn't it?

And so they are called to prepare the way of the Lord. And a big part of that preparation was going to involve the construction of a whole new section of road—a superhighway, if you will—as straight as it can possibly be, with absolutely no obstacles in the way. No valleys to have to go down into, and no mountains to have to climb up over. Why is this an important detail? Because it means that God is going to come to the aid of his people, and they're going to want his way to be as straight, and level, and smooth as it can possibly be, so that there will be nothing at all to delay his coming.

Now I have to admit to you that if we had a time machine and could travel back to this particular moment in history, we wouldn't be able to find that there was any major road construction project going on in this part of the world. Valleys were not being filled in, and mountains were not being leveled. So what on earth could Isaiah be talking about here?

When Isaiah wrote these words, he may well have thinking about the ancient practice of constructing a ceremonial pathway to welcome a visiting dignitary. Sometimes communities would use these pathways to make sure that the visit would be something special. Only in this case, Isaiah doesn't so much want us to be thinking of building a literal highway as he does making a way in the midst of a people who felt abandoned and downtrodden. He wants the people to know that there really is something to look forward to, something that was worth getting excited about, and it was coming for sure. And now was the time to start getting ready for it.

But if that preparation doesn't involve gathering a bunch of heavy equipment and building supplies, then what does it involve?

Well, let me tell you, it's not complicated. For us, to prepare the way means not letting go of hope. It means holding onto our trust. God still comes to the help of his people. What we're going through right now? It's not going to last forever. God will see us through. There will be better times to come. And God is never going to stop holding our hand.

We also prepare the way when we think of others, when we let kindness rule over all. We prepare the way when we continue to be generous, when we stand up for what's right and what's true. When we don't let the despair win.

Christmas is coming. And though that thought may bring a little stress along with it, we've got to keep remembering what it all really means. That God is for us. That God came to us. That God continues to come to us.

And his coming really is something to start getting excited about. He is coming soon! And we can't wait for him to get here. So prepare the way. Make the way straight and smooth and level, with absolutely nothing to get in his way. "Then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together." Amen.

CARING CONVERSATIONS

Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- What is some good news you have heard recently?
- What events in the news do people consider to be positive news or good news?
- The word gospel means good news. How is the coming of Christ into our world good news for you?

DEVOTIONS

Read: Mark 1:1-8.

The beginning of a book helps set up what the book is about and where the story is going. This is true of the Gospel of Mark as well. Mark 1:1-8 is part of Mark's prologue (vv. 1-13) and was used in ancient writings with this very purpose in mind: to give information that helps people follow the story as it unfolds. Mark's point is that good news ("good tidings" in Isaiah 40:9), the gospel, is beginning to happen through Jesus Christ, the Son of God. This good news is linked to John the baptizer who is himself reminiscent of Elijah. When Elijah comes again, God's people will encounter God's promised deliverance (Malachi 4:5). That future time is now present through Jesus. John's message of repentance (v. 4) will be continued by Jesus when he says, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news" (Mark 1:14). Where do you see the good news of Jesus happening today?

Pray: Merciful God, we thank you for fulfilling your promise of hope and peace through the good news of Jesus Christ. Amen.

SERVICE

Good news has a positive effect on people. Isaiah 40 gives prophetic comfort to God's people. What word of comfort or encouragement can you give to someone this week?

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

Set up a Christmas nativity set in your home. Place the wise men further away from the set for now. Wait to place Jesus in the manger until Christmas Eve. On your Advent wreath, light the first candle of hope and the second one of peace. Pause for a moment to sit in silence and look upon the nativity set and think about the coming of Jesus.

Say this Bible verse: Let me hear what God the Lord will speak, for he will speak peace to his people. (Psalm 85:8a)

Pray: Lord, help us to prepare the way of the Lord. Give us peace and hope. Amen.
